







What is Democratic Life?




Democratic life refers to active involvement in the processes that shape society through democratic systems, where citizens have a say in decisions that affect their communities, countries, and the world.





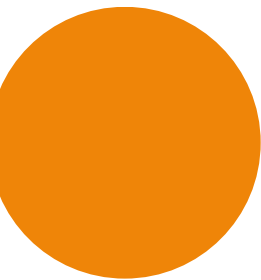
What is Democratic Life?

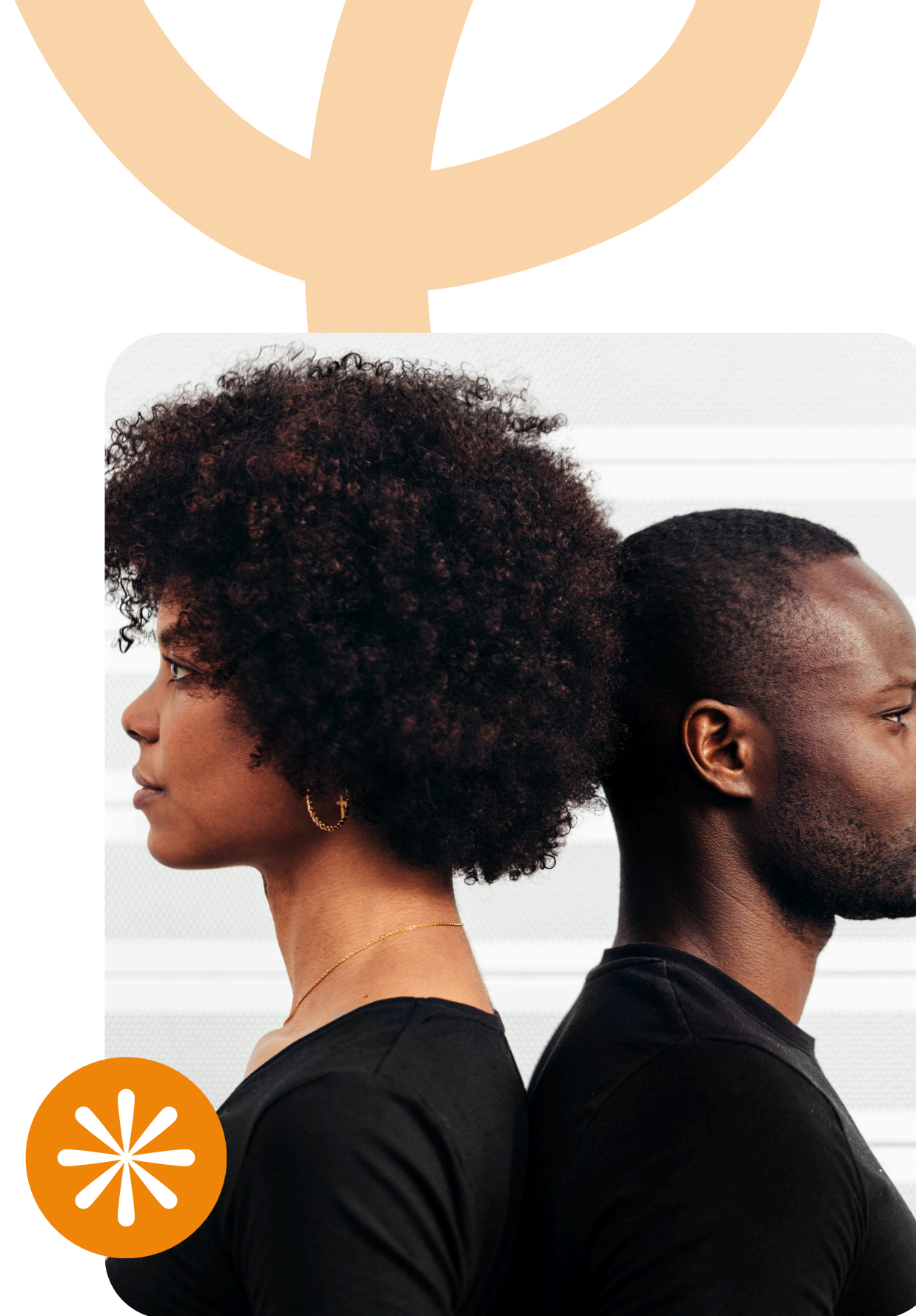
Opportunities for Civic Engagement through Voting, Advocacy, and Public Forums

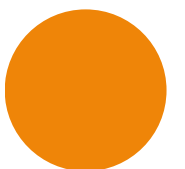
The Connection Between Democracy and Sustainability


Community Organizing and Activism

Voting and Political Engagement

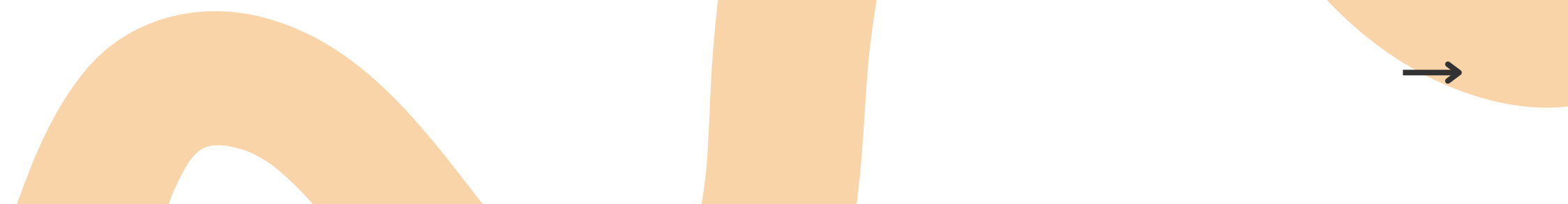
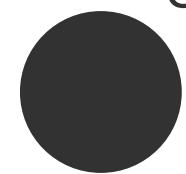

Fridays for Future

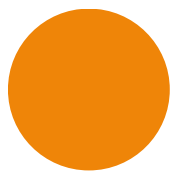
Initiated by Swedish climate activist Greta Thunberg, Fridays for Future is a global movement encouraging students to strike from school on Fridays to demand urgent action on climate change. This movement has inspired millions of young people worldwide to advocate for stronger climate policies, highlighting the need for immediate government action.

Extinction Rebellion

Founded in 2018, Extinction Rebellion (XR) is a youth-led movement that uses nonviolent civil disobedience to compel governments to act on the climate crisis. With actions such as protests, sit-ins, and disruptions, XR aims to raise awareness and pressure policymakers to take meaningful action to combat climate change and ecological destruction.

Sunrise Movement

The Sunrise Movement is a youth-led organization in the United States focused on advocating for a Green New Deal to address climate change and economic inequality. Through grassroots organizing and advocacy, the movement mobilizes young people to engage with political leaders and promote sustainable policies.

Empowerment Through Voting:

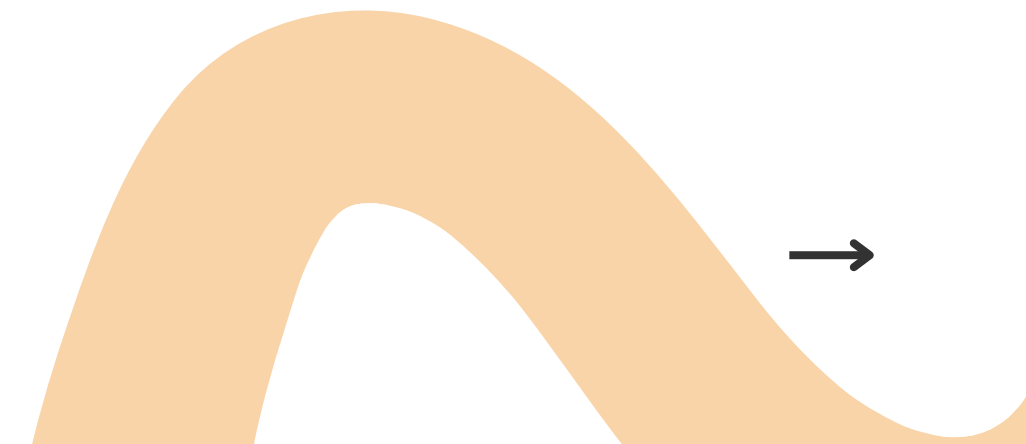
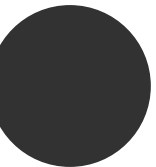
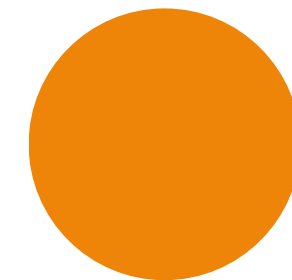

Case Study: Youth-Led Environmental Success

Real-World Example: The Plastic Bag Ban in California

Background:

- In California, young activists played a pivotal role in the campaign to ban single-use plastic bags, which significantly contributed to environmental degradation and pollution. The movement was driven by concerned youth who recognized the urgent need to address plastic waste and protect their local ecosystems.

Youth Engagement:

- High school students from various environmental clubs collaborated to raise awareness about the harmful effects of plastic pollution. They organized rallies, created social media campaigns, and engaged their peers in discussions about sustainability and environmental responsibility. Case Study: Youth-Led Environmental Success

Non-Formal Activity: Youth-Led Environmental Success Workshop

Objective:

To empower participants to create and present their own youth-led environmental campaigns, drawing inspiration from real-world examples of successful advocacy.

Materials Needed:

- Flip charts or poster boards
- Markers, pens, and colored pencils
- Sticky notes
- Access to online resources (for research purposes)
- Handouts on successful youth-led campaigns





Non-Formal Activity: "Virtual Eco-Network Challenge"

Instructions:

Introduction (20 minutes):

Begin the workshop by discussing the importance of youth engagement in environmental advocacy. Share the case study of the plastic bag ban in California as an example of how young people can effect change. Highlight key strategies used in the campaign, such as awareness-raising, advocacy, and community engagement.

Group Formation (10 minutes):

Divide participants into small groups (4-6 people each). Encourage diversity in each group to promote collaboration and idea-sharing.

Campaign Brainstorming (30 minutes):

Each group will brainstorm ideas for an environmental campaign that addresses a specific local issue (e.g., plastic waste, climate action, biodiversity loss).





Non-Formal Activity: "Virtual Eco-Network Challenge"

Presentation (30 minutes):

Each group will present their campaign plan to the larger group (5-7 minutes per group). Encourage feedback and discussion from the other participants, fostering a supportive environment.

Reflection (20 minutes):

Conclude the workshop with a reflection session where participants discuss:

- What they learned about youth-led advocacy
- How they can apply these lessons to their own communities
- The importance of collaboration and creativity in driving environmental change

Outcome:

Participants will leave with a deeper understanding of how to mobilize their peers and advocate for environmental issues. They will have developed skills in campaign planning, teamwork, and public speaking, all while fostering a sense of empowerment and agency in their ability to influence positive change in their communities.
